Adult leaders and youth members share the responsibility for the safety of all participants in the program, including adherence to Youth Protection and health and safety policies.

Adult leaders are responsible for monitoring behavior and intervening when necessary. Physical violence, sexual activity, emotional abuse, spiritual abuse, unauthorized weapons, hazing, discrimination. harassment, initiation rites, bullying, cyber bullying, theft, verbal insults, drugs, alcohol, and pornography have no place in the Scouting program and may result in revocation of membership.

A disservice is also done to the child, who is not trained to participate in such an activity and who, as a nonmember of the group, may be ignored by the older campers or be at risk from activities that are not age appropriate."

## **Risk Reduction**

<u>Guide to Safe Scouting—</u> <u>Camping-Lightning Risk Reduction</u>.

In many parts of the country, Scouting activities in the outdoors will be at risk to thunderstorms and lightning strike potential. In a thunderstorm, there is no risk-free location outside.

First, to be prepared for your outdoor adventure, it is important to know the weather patterns of the area. Weather patterns on the Florida coast differ greatly from the mountains of New Mexico and the lakes of Minnesota or the rivers of West Virginia. In addition to patterns, monitor current weather forecasts and conditions of the area you plan to visit to modify your plans if needed.

The National Weather Service recommends that when the "Thunder Roars, Go Indoors! The only completely safe action is to get inside a safe building or vehicle." When a safe building or vehicle is nearby, the best risk-reduction technique is to get to it as soon as possible. Move quickly when you:

- First hear thunder,
- See lightning, or
- Observe dark, threatening clouds developing overhead.

Stay inside until 30 minutes after you last hear the last rumble of

thunder before resuming outdoor activities. Shelter—two forms:
Safe Building—one that is fully enclosed with a roof, walls, and floor, and has plumbing or wiring.
Examples of safe buildings include a home, school, church, hotel, office building, or shopping center.

Safe Vehicle—any fully enclosed, metal-topped vehicle such as a hard topped car, minivan, bus, truck, etc. If you drive into a thunderstorm, slow down and use extra caution. If possible, pull off the road into a safe area. Do NOT leave the vehicle during a thunderstorm.

Risk Reduction (when no safe building or vehicle is nearby):

If camping, hiking, etc., far from a safe vehicle or building, avoid open fields, the top of a hill, or a ridge top. Spread your group out 100 feet from each other if possible. Stay away from tall, isolated trees; flag poles; totem poles; or other tall objects. If you are in a forest, stay near a lower stand of trees.

If you are camping in an open area, set up camp in a valley, ravine, or other low area, but avoid flood-prone areas. Remember, a tent offers NO protection from lighting.

Stay away from water, wet items (such as ropes), and metal objects (such as fences and poles). Water

and metal are excellent conductors of electricity.

If boating and you cannot get back to land to a safe building or vehicle: On a small boat, drop anchor and get as low as possible. Large boats with cabins, especially those with lightning protection systems properly installed, or metal marine vessels offer a safer but not risk-free environment. Remember to stay inside the cabin and away from any metal surfaces.

If lightning strikes, be prepared to administer CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) so that you can tend to lightning victims quickly (they do not hold an electrical charge). Take anyone who is a victim of a lightning strike or near-strike to the nearest medical facility as soon as possible, even if the person appears to be unharmed.

Advancement Defined: It Is a Method—Not an End in Itself. Advancement is simply a means to an end, not an end in itself. It is one of several methods designed to help unit leadership carry out the aims and mission of the Boy Scouts of America.

# <u>2.0.0.3 Personal Growth</u> Is the Primary Goal.

Scouting skills—what a young person learns to do—is important, but not as important as the primary goal of *personal growth* achieved through participating in a unit program. The concern is for total, well-rounded development. Ageappropriate surmountable hurdles are placed before members, and as they face these challenges they learn about themselves and gain confidence.

# **Merit Badges**

"There is more to merit badges than simply providing opportunities to learn skills."

The Blue Card – It is the nationally

recognized merit badge record. The use of blue cards is mandated by BSA. However, Tentaroo has

been approved by GAC as an acceptable reporting method for merit badges.

Unit leaders should regularly review the policies and procedures related to the merit badge process with Scouts, parents, guardians, and leaders, and counsel them on proper methods as the need arises.

Merit Badge Counselors must be registered adult leaders. They register at no fee, using the Boy Scouts of America's standard adult registration form with position code 42. Designated members of the council

or district advancement committee should provide the approval signature.

Merit Badge Counselor PowerPoint Presentation – "The Essentials of Merit Badge Counseling" This PowerPoint presentation with speaker notes covers the required procedures for merit badge counseling, clarifies the role of counselors in the BSA advancement program, and discusses the appropriate approaches to use in working with Scouts. It is intended as an instructor-led presentation to counselors of any experience level and takes 60 to 90 minutes to complete. Download PowerPoint Presentation

Volunteers who are properly registered as merit badge counselors can renew annually without completing a BSA adult application; their names will appear on the district

> roster for renewal. Anyone who is currently unregistered, or who is registered in another position but also desires to

serve as a merit badge counselor, must complete an adult application.

# **Eagle Scout Rank**

Reference <u>9.0.2.14 Risk Management and Eagle Scout Service Projects.</u>

All Eagle Scout service projects constitute official Scouting activity and thus are subject to Boy Scouts of America policies and procedures. Projects are considered part of a unit's program and are treated as such with regard to policies, procedures, and requirements regarding Youth Protection, two-deep leadership, etc. Unit leadership should be aware of project plans and schedules. The health and safety of those working on Eagle projects must be integrated into project execution. Since an Eagle Scout service project is a unit activity, unit adult leadership has the same responsibility to assure safety in conducting a project as with any other unit activity. The unit leader or unit committee should reject proposals for inherently unsafe projects. The candidate should plan for safe execution, but it must be understood that minors cannot and must not be held responsible for safety concerns. As with any Scouting activity, the Guide to Safe Scouting applies. The "Sweet 16 of BSA Safety" must also be consulted as an appropriate planning tool. It can be found

2 on the Eagle Scout Rank Application. This may be done by letter, form, or phone call. For reasons of pri-

vacy and confidentiality, electronic submissions are discouraged.

It is acceptable to send or deliver to the references an addressed envelope with instructions, and perhaps a form to complete. Scouts may assist with this, but that is the limit of their participation. Scouts are not responsible for follow-through or any other aspect of the process. It is up to the council's designated representatives to collect the responses. If after a reasonably diligent effort, no response can be obtained from any references, the board of review must go on without them. It must not be postponed or denied for this reason, and the Scout shall not be asked to submit additional references or to provide replacements.

Completed reference responses of any kind are the property of the council and are confidential, and only review-board members and those officials with a specific need may see them. The responses are not to be viewed by or returned to

the Scout. Doing so could discourage the submission of negative information. For the same reason, those providing references do not have the option of giving the reference directly to

the Scout and shall not be given the option of waiving confidentiality. Once a review has been held, or an appeal process conducted, responses shall be returned to the council, where they will be destroyed after the Eagle Scout credentials are released or the appeal is concluded.


# **District Camporee**
